## **Considerations for SBIRT Model**

SBIRT: Screening, Brief Intervention, and Referral to Treatment

Tips for how to best support LGBTQ+ patients:

- Adapt the model for transgender and non-binary (TNB) populations by tailoring each step of the SBIRT approach to a TNB patient's unique needs and background. [2]
- Seek permission from patients to discuss the results of screening tools, as well as limitations for use with transgender and non-binary populations.

The odds of substance use for LGBTQ+ adolescents are, on average, 190% greater than for heterosexual, cisgender adolescents. [3]
