Providing Transgender & Non-binary (TNB)-Affirming Care

Tips for how to best support transgender & non-binary patients:

Support and affirm transgender and non-binary adolescents
For example, use patients' affirmed names and pronouns
Use TNB-affirming language for brief interventions
For example, say: "Some transgender and non-binary clients experience unique stressors, or might struggle with gender dysphoria, which may result in using alcohol or other substances" (affirming), instead of "I assume you have been drinking more because of the stress you experience each day as a

community

For example, invite TNB individuals to participate on patient advisory boards (if your practice has one); hire TNB people

into positions at the clinic

Actively engage with members of the TNB

transgender person" (non-affirming)

Students who are transgender or nonbinary report **significantly** poorer health status, lower rates of preventive health checkups, and more visits to the nurse's office than their cisgender (nontransgender) peers. [1]

Tip: Provide education and referral for the process of gender transition and about avoiding the pitfalls of using treatments that were not prescribed by a licensed physician.

"I would be kind of like proud that they're actually recognizing and accepting transgender males and females because a lot of hospitals, as well as public places, they choose not to so I think it's important that they're starting somewhere." [2]
